

# FROM RED SOX TO Hunting Fox

Bill Gutfarb on Riding, Responsibility, and Retirement

ome people are born with riding in their blood, other people grow into it. Bill Gutfarb is the latter. It wasn't until Gutfarb was grown and his own daughter began riding that he was introduced to the world of horses. Gutfarb enjoyed a variety of athletics throughout his life—from baseball, to hockey, to golf, and beyond—so it was no surprise when he decided, as horses accumulated in his historic Dover, Mass., barn, to begin riding himself. "I thought, jeez, if I'm paying for all of this, I think I'll get some enjoyment out of it!" he laughs.

Gutfarb joined the Norfolk Hunt Club in the early 1990s and began schooling with the hounds before progressing to riding out in the field on the flat, and finally going over every jump in the field. Even with a full-time job, Gutfarb made time to ride. "I would do a Tuesday hunt and my wife, Wendy, would then take the horses back while I'd go straight home and shower, change, and go into my office—it was a very enjoyable lifestyle!" he recalls.

In 1973, Gutfarb began working with the Boston Red Sox after his junior year in college at Boston University. He approached a professor about summer job opportunities,

"Not many people stay with the same organizations for their entire adult life. I started in '73 and, though I'm retired from full-time work, I'm still a trustee of the Yawkey Foundations," explains Gutfarb. "So, I think it was very fortunate that I agreed I wasn't going to quit after a couple of days on the ground crew—and it led to a career that has been very rewarding."

Working his way up to executive vice president and treasurer of the organization, Gutfarb was responsible for—beyond baseball—Mrs. Yawkey's investments, the Yawkey Foundation, and the 25,000-acre Tom Yawkey Wildlife Center in Georgetown, SC—where he first became familiar with the state of South Carolina.

With yearly trips South between work and horse showing on Wendy's part, when the pair decided to retire they settled on Aiken—a thriving equestrian community. But, before they became full-time residents in 2014, Gutfarb was diagnosed with not only sarcoidosis—which affects his heart and lungs—but breast cancer as well. "So that was it for me," he says. "I stopped riding at that point."

and, when asked what he wanted to do, Gutfarb said he'd like to work for the Red Sox. He was able to land an interview with the head of the grounds crew—an experience he'll never forget. "I sat at the corner of Joe Mooney's desk, the head groundskeeper, and he gave me an application to fill out and he said, 'You know, this is just sweeping and cleaning, it's not glamorous work. We get guys like you coming in here for a couple of days and then they quit—so think about it."

Gutfarb decided to stick it out—a choice that would shape the rest of his career. The following year, he began working in the Red Sox ticket office in the summers and the accounting office in the winters until he completed his MBA from Babson College and went into accounting full-time with the organization. That's where Gutfarb would stay until 1982 when he went to work for then-owner, Jean Yawkey, at the Boston Trust Management Corporation. "The Yawkeys were as kind as you can imagine," he says. "They treated people the way that they would want to be treated."

Though Gutfarb's riding journey has ended, he and Wendy remain heavily involved in the equestrian community. Wendy is a joint master of the Aiken Hounds, and, together, they decided to go into a racing partnership as well. "We've had five race horses total, and two of them Wendy fox hunts now," Gutfarb says.


Little did he know, however, that owning race horses would lead to his next big journey. In 2018, Gutfarb was approached by Aiken Training Track. Looking for someone with a business mind who knows numbers, he was elected to the board. Then, in September 2019, Gutfarb was elected as President of the track. "I think the best thing that could happen with the training track is that our numbers go up for track use and our stall usage goes up," he says.


A sensible businessman, Gutfarb doesn't miss being in the saddle because, "What's the sense of missing something if you know you can't do it?" But he doesn't have to—his life is still full of horses.

hen the temperatures drop and the snow begins to fly, many New England residents head south to an equestrian Mecca, Aiken, S.C. With its charming historic roots and incredible homage to everything horse, it is no wonder that many horse lovers find themselves spending the winter months here.

Horse events are a plenty, with a multitude of local training events happening on the regular. This is a wonderful way to expose your horse to a variety of challenges in a low-key environment. Aiken is also the proud home of larger competitive facilities including the Highfields Event Center (psjshows.com) and the Aiken Horse Park (aikenhorsepark.com).

Adding to incredible equestrian allure is the 2,100-acre forest of Hitchcock Woods that offers over 70 miles of meticulously maintained riding trails. They even have special traffic lights that are horse height for crossing Whiskey Road from one of the favorite parking areas to get into the woods! There is someone riding in the woods almost every day, driving carriages, hacking, houndrunning, and walking (hitchcockwoods.org).

While many equestrians pull into Aiken with a trailer in tow, there is also a local airport, which makes it convenient to travel in and out of the city (aikenaviation.com).


#### Where to Stay

Once you start to plan your trip to Aiken, it's time to make reservations as the local hotels fill quickly, especially during the races or larger horse shows.

Experience southern hospitality at its finest when you visit The Willcox. This white-pillared Colonial Revival landmark on the National Historic Register, has been a permanent fixture in the town since 1898. Starting with the inviting rocking chairs lining its pristine, white-columned front porch, it represents the casual glamour of a bygone era. Guest rooms at The Willcox are comfortable retreats luxuriously appointed. The award-winning restaurant is a local favorite and a must for hotel guests (thewillcox.com).







There is also a number of popular hotel chains that you can confidently book a room at. Consider the Hilton Garden, Hampton Inn, Fairfield Inn and Suites, Country Inn and Suites, or Townplace Suites.

If you plan to make Aiken more than a visit, the local equestrian communities are amazing. New Bridge is an 861-acre private, gated equestrian community just 15 minutes from downtown Aiken. Born from the excitement, intensity, and tradition of polo, it is the home of New Bridge Polo & Country Club, with five world-class fields and thrilling medium goal polo tournaments during Spring and Fall seasons (newbridgepolo.com).

#### Where to Eat

Looking to start your day with a delicious breakfast? The Training Track is a must! Located at the Thoroughbred training track, the food is wonderful and is a great deal. After you have fueled up, head out to the track and watch the hopefuls training (aikentrainingtrack.com).

For lunch and dinner, you have a multitude of delicious options. Check out the Aiken Fish House and Oyster Bar, a local family-owned seafood restaurant and Oyster Bar specializing in fresh domestic seafood (aikenfishhouse.com). We encourage you to check out Whiskey Alley for a delicious selection of craft whiskey and one of the best burgers in town (whiskeyalley.com).

Test out the local craft beer scene at The Alley Downtown Tap Room (thealleydowntowntaproom.com) and Aiken Brewing Company (aikenbrewingcompany.com).

Prime Steakhouse is an authentic, big-city steakhouse that serves the finest in aged steaks, whole lobsters, and fresh seafood. The atmosphere of the restaurant includes modern artwork on brick walls and an exciting bar serving premium drinks (primesteakhouseaiken.com).

The Aiken County Museum is well worth the trip. Featuring a gorgeous backdrop on the edge of Hitchcock Woods, this museum houses wonderful displays and an unabashed look at southern history (aikencountysc.gov).

For the passionate shopper, Downtown Aiken on Laurens Street is simply the best, with nothing but cute shops that sell everything from hardware to high-end men's wear! There is a multitude of shopping locations, but for the equestrian there is nothing that compares to heading to the local tack shop!
